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
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
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
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PAUL FRANCIS WEBSTER

Paul Francis Webster was born on December 20, 1907 in New York City. He attended Cornell University and New York University and, for a time, was a sailor and then a dance instructor. However, by 1931 his career as a lyricist had begun and he would become one of Hollywood's most successful lyricists.

In 1935, he went to Hollywood under contract with Twentieth Century Fox with the intent to write for Shirley Temple films. Soon after, he became a freelance writer and in 1941 he had his first hit with Duke Ellington entitled "I Got It Bad (And That Ain't Good)".

After 1950, Webster worked mostly for MGM, and primarily with composer Sammy Fain. Together they won two Academy Awards, for the song "Secret Love" from the film Calamity Jane (1953), and then for "Love Is A Many-Splendored Thing" from the 1955 film of the same name.

Outside of films, Webster's songs achieved popular recognition with the help from recording artists such as Peggy Lee and Tony Bennett. He also wrote the lyrics to the memorable theme song for the animated 1960s Spider-Man series. The theme song has since become synonymous with the title character. It was played in some form in all three Spider-Man films. Paul was inducted into the Songwriters Hall of Fame in 1972 and died in Beverly Hills, California in 1984.



SAMMY FAIN

Sammy Fain was born on June 17, 1902 in New York City. From 1925, Fain devoted himself full-time to composing, working extensively in collaboration with Irving Kahal. Together they wrote classics such as "Let a Smile Be Your Umbrella".

Fain also composed music for more than 30 films in the 1930s, 40s and 50s. He was nominated for the best Original Song Oscar nine

times, winning twice, with "Secret Love" from Calamity Jane in 1954 and with "Love Is a Many-Splendored Thing" from the movie of the same title in 1955. He co-wrote both songs with Paul Francis Webster, another long-time collaborator. Fain wrote the second theme to the TV series Wagon Train in 1958, which was called "(Roll Along) Wagon Train". He also contributed to the song scores for the Walt Disney animated films Alice in Wonderland, Peter Pan, and The Rescuers.

In 1963, he collaborated with Harold Adamson in writing songs for the movie The Incredible Mr. Limpet, which came out in 1964, and such songs as "I Wish I Were a Fish", "Be Careful How You Wish" and "Deep Rapture" enhanced his fame.

Fain died in Los Angeles, California, on 6 December 1989.

The Story

Setting - wild-west outpost of Deadwood City, 1876

It's the late nineteenth century in Deadwood, located in the Dakota Territory. Jane Canary - better known as Calamity Jane or Calam for short - is a sharp shooter who takes it upon herself to protect the area, especially the stagecoach, from the marauding Sioux. Her skill and fearlessness is matched only by Wild Bill Hickock, with whom she has a friendly rivalry, but who she still considers her best friend.


Calam shows no signs of femininity, in spite of being in love with a soldier, Lieutenant Danny Gilmartin but, despite having been saved before by Calam, Danny only sees her as one of the guys and has no idea that she loves him.

There is a dearth of females in the area and, as such, Harvey Miller or Milly for short, the proprietor of the local saloon "The Golden Garter", brings in actresses to perform whenever he can to entertain the men who are starved for female companionship. So, when Milly's latest attempt to bring in an actress doesn't turn out quite the way he expects, Calam takes it upon herself to bring in the most famous Chicago actress, Adelaide Adams, to keep the peace in Deadwood.

Calam's attempt to bring in Adelaide starts a series of events which make Calam examine her feminine side, and what it may take to get Danny to propose. But, in doing so, Calam may ultimately realise what she really wants in life...

PRODUCER

GRAHAM WESTON: Graham's involvement in the theatre began at an early age and his love of musicals has led him to play many principal roles, specialising mainly in comic leads. He won 'Best Supporting Actor' at the International Festival of Musical Theatre, and has now developed a successful career as both performer and stage director. Graham has performed with or directed for many societies in the Yorkshire area. He has directed the G&S Operas, Musicals, Operetta and Pantomimes. Also performed in professional pantomime and worked in York for Mark Mark Productions. This Autumn he will once again be touring with the West Yorkshire Savoyards whilst future directing work includes The Yeomen of the Guard, Patience and Iolanthe. Graham is delighted to be working on his fifth production with this talented and friendly society and would like to thank everybody for the work they have put into the show.

MUSICAL DIRECTOR

COLIN AKERS: Colin started his musical life quite late at the age of 11 and at 16 went to Chethams School of Music with joint first study instruments of piano and flute. He attended Huddersfield University studying primarily music performance. He joined Halifax G&S in 1988, initially as accompanist, then promoted to Musical Director in 2000. He became the Musical Director for Batley G&S in 2005 and joined All Souls' in the same capacity in 2009. Since starting with All Souls' he has striven to continue the high performance standards expected and has championed new and varied composers in the Accent On Song concerts, with works ranging from the 15th Century to the present day, enabling the Society to showcase it's abilities and talents. As well as being an accompanist, Colin is also a member of an orchestra that supports several societies throughout West and North Yorkshire.

ACCOMPANISTS

CHRISTOPHER PULLEYN: Christopher enjoys a busy and varied career as a collaborative pianist, répétiteur and conductor. He currently studies with Michael Dussek, Head of Accompaniment at the Royal Academy of Music in London. Christopher works regularly with a number of large arts organisations, predominantly around the North of England. Since 2013 he has worked with Opera North on their many outreach programmes and Opera productions. Other organisations include BBC Proms, Glyndebourne, the Hallé, Huddersfield Choral Society, Leeds Lieder and Sage Gateshead. He is pianist-in-residence for Greenhead College, Assistant Musical Director for Bradford Festival Choral Society, and accompanies regularly at Leeds College of Music and the University of Hull. In 2018, he launched the Piano Music Festival in Huddersfield, an annual series of collaborative piano chamber concerts, presenting more classical music in the town, and a chance to showcase up-coming and established artists with a connection to the region. Having worked with ASAOS since 2010 (Kismet) he is delighted to be joining All Souls' once again for Calamity Jane.

PHILIP SUTCLIFFE: Philip got his first piano at the tender age of five. Although it stood just three inches off the ground, had only nine keys and was made of purple plastic he made swift progress and eventually managed to gain entrance into Huddersfield University where he studied big piano. Having spent several years studying music he ran away to join a touring theatre company. As an actor he has toured most of England, the bottom bit of Germany and bits of Scotland, including taking shows to the Edinburgh Festival. He has performed Beckett in Minsk and Shakespeare in Kiev, but that was all a very long time ago. Philip has played for ASAOS on numerous occasions, and we welcome him back for Calamity Jane.



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
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ABOUT ALL SOULS' AMATEUR OPERATIC SOCIETY

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
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
